- "Code Red" for nature & planet: we are entering dangerous new territory on climate impacts, biodiversity loss, & planetary boundaries
- A "new poor" from COVID-19: lockdowns and recession threaten billions with hardship & suffering; progress towards SDGs imperiled
- Rocketing inequality: the pandemic has massively accelerated the ongoing growth in inequality between rich & poor
- Fragile shoots of green recovery: some policymakers are seizing the opportunity to put their economies on a new footing
- But progress is patchy and fragile: we are in danger of squandering this once-in-a-generation opportunity for structural transformation
- Decision: Green recovery our key advocacy priority in run up to Stockholm+50 (June 2022)

- The social contract is broken: unrest and populism are growing as COVID-19 has exposed and exacerbated political and economic inequality
- The transition to a green and fair economy **requires deep** social support.
- The GEC are building a **progressive**, **intersectional alliance climate**, **environmental** & **inequality champions** to highlight pathways, procedures and mechanisms for renegotiating a new social contract in practice.
- Decision: GEC's approach to inequality will centre around social contract, approved for collaborative development

- Massive COVID-19 stimulus packages present the opportunity to accelerate the green transition
- But nature and biodiversity have been mostly neglected in stimulus packages
- Investing in nature pays off: with green jobs created, natural disaster damages averted, mitigation costs reduced and SDG goals achieved
- "Nature is everyone's business" but the private sector still largely blind to impact on nature
- A new, clear vision for biodiversity based around the value of nature is urgently needed: transformation, not conservation
- Economics for Nature is changing the rules, the conversation and the calculations towards a nature-based green economy
- Decision: Work with E4N and other partners around Stockholm+50 moment to further embed nature's value in economic decision-making, and make it a political imperative


Afternoon side session

 Taking our Green COVID-19 Declaration global: a GEC-led workshop to refine and draft the joint declaration on green recovery

Key messages:

- The G20 has pledged at least \$325 billion to support fossil fuels since Jan 2020, compared to \$279 billion for clean energy
- Clean energy investment upscaling needs to happen right now to achieve 2050 net-zero. "Green Keynesianism" is needed to guide investors & consumers alike
- **53**% **of participants** in our Green Recovery on Trial event rated the current state of the global recovery as a D "Underwhelmed but still have a glimmer of hope."
- Decision: "Declaration on a Green COVID-19 Recovery" finalized together with attendees and ready for public sharing



Declaration on a green COVID-19 recovery

We the undersigned call for a green and fair recovery from COVID where no one is left behind. We declare that this will not be achieved without structural transformation to ensure our economies are nature-positive, net zero, fair and inclusive for all.

Decision makers are squandering the opportunity to build back better from COVID-19. Current recovery policies are entrenching inequality, propping up fossil fuel industries and doubling down on the destruction of nature.

COP26 has failed to respond to the Code Red facing people and planet. We are still on course for more than 2 degrees warming – subjecting millions to starvation, conflict, and poverty, while nature is being forgotten. We know that environmental and social injustices share the same root causes – and activism as usual is no longer an option.

Experience has show us that governments will not go far or fast enough without citizens demanding urgent reform. Business cannot move ahead of societal demand for change. And investors need strong social signals to shift their myopic, short-term horizons.

Therefore, we are uniting as a civil society movement across the world because we see that people, not power, are driving positive change.

We commit to building a mass movement of informed citizens to engage decision makers, and each other, to raise green recovery ambition, broker links with power and share solutions and experience from around the world.

We pledge to hold governments and businesses to account on their promises to build back better – scrutinizing their responses, driving transparency, and delivering justice.

We promise to connect with other movements and networks, amplify the voices of activists around the world, and accelerate social change being led by movements of women, youth, indigenous people, marginalised communities and more.

But civic action is not alone enough.

We demand that those in positions of power prioritise structural and transformative measures to build a green and inclusive recover from COVID.

- DELIVER a green recovery finance package for the global south, on top of existing climate finance commitments;
- INVEST in nature, green infrastructure, green jobs and green reskilling;
- REWRITE the institutions and rules that govern us so they prioritise
 participation via citizen assemblies and juries, civic dialogue, and inclusive
 policy;
- END fossil fuel investment, fossil fuel subsidies, and financing that is exploiting nature;
- **BUILD** an inclusive, just social contract fit for the 21st century that leaves no one no person, no small business, no community behind.
